It's Christmas time. Grab a cup of hot chocolate, pull up a chair, and join me by the fire. While the frost gathers outside, let's consider the significance of this wonderful season. There are so many choices when deciding upon which event to focus. For instance, there are the wise men that came bearing gifts, the shepherds who hear the angelic proclamation, the bright shining star, the innkeeper's role, Mary, Joseph, and so much more. There are also many questions that one can ponder regarding the events, the announcements, the characters and the location. In light of all these options, I still come back to the question, "Why?" Not, why did God come to earth in the first place? I know that answer and have experienced His saving touch. But, why did He choose a peasant woman, an old barn and a feeding trough? I don't pretend to know the mind of God, but I believe we can know His heart. Let me share with you what I think. I pray it blesses and encourages you.

It seems to me that once you see God in a stable, you quickly learn He will go anywhere in His pursuit of man. The embarrassment of the King of Kings having a manger for a bed, tells me that He is willing to go to ludicrous depths of humiliation to rescue the perishing. If you stand gazing into the face of the newborn child, you cannot help but see God's glory, holiness, and majesty. This tells me there is no place on earth so cold, so dark or so distant that God's glory cannot

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penetrate; That means there is no place we can go to escape God's presence. Christmas – Tradition and Scripture

Christmas is without question the most celebrated holiday in the year. The genesis of its celebration is the birth of Jesus, but it has become encrusted with things that are not only not Christian but often anti- Christian. However, there are also those traditions that are either part of scripture or are consistent with the Bible. As believers we want to rejoice in everything about our Lord's birth that we find in God's Word. We are also free to include in our celebration those things that while not found explicitly in the text are harmonious with it. For example, Christmas trees are an acceptable part of Christmas. They were first used in what we now call Germany in the seventh century. The basically triangular shape with its three points were meant to symbolize the trinity. However, Santa Claus is completely unacceptable for Christians because he is a pseudo Christ. Omniscience, a quality that is unique to God, is ascribed to Santa Claus when as the song says, he knows when you are sleeping, he knows if you're awake. Tradition also gives him a near omnipresence since he is all over the world in one night. And of course, with Santa Claus salvation comes because you are good - he knows if you've been good or bad, so be good for goodness sake. But Christians recognize that our goodness never merits salvation for even our best deeds are filthy rags before a holy God. The problem is not so much recognizing that Santa Claus has no legitimate part in our celebration, rather it is the struggle against our culture which exalts Santa Claus, making him the ultimate symbol of all that is good. The traditions that surround Santa Claus are very powerful so that at every turn we find our culture aligned against the true worship of the birth of Jesus. For example, those businesses that are using Christmas to sell their products do everything they can to avoid the mention of Jesus and even the word Christmas. How many cities have holiday parades rather than Christmas parades?

A question that should be asked is whether any Christmas tradition that is not explicitly Christian is acceptable. There is not universal agreement on this point among conservative believers. This writer thinks that we have Christian liberty in these matters as long as the tradition does not oppose or undermine Christian beliefs. But, this is one of those areas where we need to allow other Christians to disagree with us without condemning them for their choice. All of us have traditions in many areas of our lives as individual Christians - as do all churches. For example, both the elements of worship services and their order differ from church to church. If we had an explicit order given in the Bible then we would all follow it, but since we do not we are free to include anything that is God honoring in whatever order we deem best. There certainly are some things that should be part of church services such as preaching, prayer and singing but even there we find wide variance in the length of sermons, the music style and the types of prayers.

There have been extended times in church history where the prevailing opinion was that Christmas should not be celebrated at all since there is no explicit command to do so in scripture. The contrast between that view and today when Christmas takes precedence over the celebration of the resurrection is extraordinary. But because there is also no command not to celebrate Christ's birth, and because His birth is one of the two most important events in history and because we have Christian freedom where an activity is not forbidden in the Bible either plainly or by implication, it does seem that we can celebrate Christmas as long as we keep the celebration in balance. Each church, each family and each person should take time to examine either its corporate or individual traditions to make sure they align with scripture. To follow a tradition without such examination can result in either a church or a person dishonoring God with our practices.

One thing we should all do is read and study the stories about Christmas in the Bible. Nativity scenes that portray the shepherds and the wise men together reflect an ignorance about the timing of those events. The shepherds visited Joseph, Mary and the Christ child at the manger shortly after the birth announcement by the angels. The wise men did not see the Lord until about two years later. We know that because they found him in a house - Matthew 2:11. And, of course, Herod ordered that males two years of age and under be killed.

The power of tradition is very strong even in light of the clarity of God's Word. It is very difficult even for Christians to change their beliefs and practices. One reason for that is that our traditions go back to our childhood and seem therefore to have always been a part of us. The singing of Christmas carols evokes very powerful memories in all of us. It is difficult for anyone to examine a carol to see if it corresponds with scripture. The one line in *Away in a Manger* that says, *no crying He makes*, is gnostic in its origin. Jesus was fully human and like every baby He cried. Gnosticism, a second century Christian heresy, borrowed from Greek philosophy the idea that the spiritual is good and the physical is evil. The apostle John was dealing with proto-Gnosticism in his first epistle when he wrote (I John 4:2), "By this you know the Spirit of God." The proto-Gnostics said it only seemed as if Jesus had a body. As Christian we must remember that Jesus was fully God and fully man.

So, enjoy the celebration of the birth of the Lord Jesus. But examine your traditions to make sure that they are either derived from scripture or consistent with the Bible and do not contradict the historic faith.

Remember

The scripture often uses the word remember; God often calls for us to remember. What is important about that word is that its meaning is not just recollection of information or persons. There are numerous examples in the Bible.

In II Peter chapter three Peter tells his readers that he wants them to remember the words spoken by the prophets and the commandment of the Lord spoken by His apostles. He says he is reminding them to remember and that this is the second time he has done so. In other words, they didn't listen the first time which forced Peter to say it again. When he says they didn't remember he is not saying they didn't recall his words. He is saying that they failed to allow his words to affect their actions. In the original language the word does not refer to a mental act. It is not just a recollection of events. It is not a passive word but an active one. Beginning in Genesis here are some ways the word is use. Genesis 8:1, "But God remembered Noah and all the beasts and all the cattle that were in the ark; and God caused a wind to pass over the earth, and the water subsided." Notice that the word remember is connected with an action, in this case a creative action.
