We read in scripture, "The things which are impossible with men are possible with God." (Luke 18:27) The writer of the letter to the Hebrews wrote, "But without faith it is impossible to please him: for him that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Hebrews 11:6) Putting those two biblical truths together we conclude that true faith in God believes God can do the impossible.

Since God can do the impossible, He can change me and He can change you. He can help us and heal us. He can use us and equip us. We learn in the Bible that for God nothing is impossible. He can speak the universe into existence. He can raise the dead, control nature, bring water from a rock, feed thousands with a little boy's lunch, shut lions' mouths, preserve men in the midst of fire and direct a fish to swallow a full-grown man. He can speak to the wind and sea and cause them to be calm or stormy. He can turn back the clock, make a lame man walk, or cause a greedy man to become generous.

Because with God all things are possible, think of the difference that can make in your life, your home, your church, and your ministry. If we are serious about wanting to know God more, then we have to become serious about what is on His mind and on His heart. If we talk about God's ability to do the impossible then we have to be willing to become the proof. This great truth compels us to love the unlovable, pray for the impossible, give praise in the midst of trouble and pain,

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speak the truth even when it's unpopular and live differently than the world around us. We must care deeply and practically for the lost. We must fortify the moral and theological training of the succeeding generation. It is these truths that keep us from giving up, from turning back, from quitting, from retreating. Our God who can do the impossible, who can and does save sinners, who uses saved sinners to carry out His work in this world, it is He who also can and will keep us for all of eternity. Going forward, I pray we will know God better as the One for whom nothing is impossible.

The Importance of Getting the Gospel Right

While we talk about the gospel all the time it is easy to miss how important it is and how important it is to get it right. The Bible is a large book containing everything we need to know about our faith but just because we have presented some scripture does not mean that we have presented the Biblical Gospel. There is certain information that should be communicated to the hearer. When you read the sermons in the New Testament you will find this information is always present. Whether it is Peter or Paul the same facts about what happened at the cross and why are included.

The fullest presentation of the gospel is found in the first eleven chapters of the book of Romans. We should study those chapters carefully so that we have the most complete understanding of the gospel and can therefore tailor our presentation to suit the person or persons we are talking to and the situation in which we find ourselves. So, for example, Paul on Mars hill makes a presentation that is unique to the situation in which he finds himself. Every person you meet is an individual with a background and experiences that he or she alone has encountered, even identical twins have differences. Therefore what is best when you are trying to lead a person to Christ is to spend time asking questions and carefully listening to the answers. Then you can answer the questions in a way best suited for that individual. When you do this you are demonstrating the love of Jesus to that person.

The gospel is encapsulated for us in 1st Corinthians 15:3-4 where the apostle Paul writes, *For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures.* Notice first of all that Paul emphasizes that the gospel is according to the scriptures. What we communicate to people is what the Bible says. We are not calling people to come to Christ based on any authority we have but rather on what God says in His Word. Thus the apostle says he delivered what he received, not what he came up with on his own. Second of all we must tell folks why Jesus died. Certainly we can expand the phrase died for our sins by pointing to the fact that we all do wrong and are therefore sinners. Any person who is honest will admit that all his or her actions were not always what he or she should have done. Pointing out that the wages of sin is death is helpful and consistent with Jesus having to die for our sins. And of course for Jesus to have been able to pay for our sins He had to be perfect since the law requires a spotless sacrifice. The statement that He was buried points both to the fact that he was dead and to the necessity of resurrection. The resurrection proves that Jesus is alive and leads to the fact that as Christians we to will be alive with him throughout eternity. Paul says the gospel is of first importance because without it no one can be saved. And if you don't have the Biblical gospel you cannot lead a person to the saving knowledge of the Savior. Without out the gospel a life well led will get you eternity in Gehenna, the lake of fire. For as the scripture says, all our righteousness is as filthy rags.

It is important to realize that that vast majority of those who hear the gospel will reject it. As Jesus said, "Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the way is broad that leads to destruction, and there are many who enter through it." (Matt. 7:13) This should not discourage us because there are still many who will respond. But the fact that most reject Christ points to one other thing that must happen for a person to come to faith. We read in Ephesians chapter two that when we were dead in our trespasses and sins God made us alive. It is the presentation of the gospel and the regenerating work of the Holy Spirit that makes a person a Christian. But since we know that there are some who will come to Christ our job is to find them. Sometimes the person who comes to faith is the one you would expect to. Often people raised in church who have heard the gospel regularly do become believers. But sometimes it is the person we would think would never trust Christ who does so. That is why we should never discriminate between people in proclaiming the gospel.

We have just been through the celebration of our Lord's death, burial and resurrection which again reminds us of what our Savior suffered that we might have eternal life. All of your sin and my sin was imputed to Him, the only person who never sinned. This is what His struggle was about in the Garden of Gethsemane. Though His physical death was painful He is not the only person to have gone through crucifixion. But no other person suffered what he did for sin.

We await eternity to even begin to comprehend the immensity of what Jesus experienced. One thing His death did was to demonstrate the depth of His love for us. He was not dying for good people but for sinners who deserved eternal death.

Jesus lived a life without sin. Evil men crucified the Lord of Glory. He was buried but on the third day He arose from the grave. While we worship on Sunday every week there is that special day, resurrection Sunday when our attention to what happened is even stronger. When you have opportunity share with those who are outside the faith that Jesus lived that perfect life, died on a cross for sinners, was buried and rose again. There is no greater joy for us as Christians than being used by God in bringing a person to saving faith.


